
RCMP JUDGE SCIENCE FAIR

The guest speakers sat and enjoyed lunch with the group then shared some safety tips and examples of frauds seniors tend to face; particular attention was given to the on-going Canada Revenue Agency fraud, given that it's currently tax season.

They also shared strategies to help prevent seniors from being

victimized. The group was engaged and had plenty of questions and concerns which were all addressed by the presenters.

Below are a few general safety tips to remember, for people of all ages.

For your residence:

- Keep doorways and windows visible
- Keep shrubs and trees trimmed
- Install good locks and use them
- Close blinds at night therefore everyone can't see your valuables inside your house
- If a stranger knocks on your door, do not allow them into your house

Over the phone:

- Do not provide personal information or bank account information
- If you are contacted by a solicitor, do not be afraid to say "No" and hang up

In your vehicle:

- When in your vehicle place valuables on the floor next to you or on the floor behind you
- Keep doors locked at all times while you are in the vehicle
- Do not keep valuables in your vehicle when you are not in



RCMP YOUTH CAMP

The RCMP will be hosting its annual Youth Camp from August $8^{th} - 12^{th}$, 2016!

Thirty-two students from across the prairies and territories will be selected to attend the RCMP Training Academy (Depot) in Regina, Saskatchewan to learn what it takes to become a RCMP officer. The students will train like cadets and will gain first-hand experience of what a career in law enforcement requires. The camp is open to interested Grade 11 and 12 students who will be selected based on their academic achievement, citizenship and interest in police work.

In addition to this camp, the RCMP Training Academy will be also be offering a similar program for interested Aboriginal youth; this session will run from August 15-19, 2016. Both camps are a wonderful opportunity for students to interact with police officers from many different units within the RCMP, and will allow them to leave with a better understanding of what life is like for members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

These events are extremely popular amongst students and feedback from those who have attended in the past has been very positive. That being said, it's still a very competitive process and not all students will be selected to attend.

Wood Buffalo RCMP partnered with the Oil Barons and took 4 players (Tyler Dea, Shawn Weber, Shane Fraser, and Hayden Ursulak) to the downtown eastside of Vancouver to witness first-hand the effects of drug use. The players have begun presenting to the Grade 5 and 6 classes in schools across the region and have shared their stories with the kids. The Oil Barons have been enthusiastic, informative, and have explained to all the students why it's important to have a plan in the event they are peer pressured to do drugs.



The RCMP needs help in naming a handful of their newest (and cutest) recruits!

13 German Shepherd puppies, soon to be born at the Police Dog Service Training Centre (PDSTC) in Innisfail, Alberta, are in need of names. Children across the country are encouraged to be original and imaginative in finding names that will serve these puppies well in their career with the RCMP. When thinking of names, it is important to keep in mind that these are working police dogs, not pets.

NAME THE PUPPY

In 2015, over 21,000 entries were submitted with a local Fort McMurray student from Ecole St. Paul winning the opportunity to name one of the 13 puppies. Her entry of 'Hammer' was chosen and Hammer is currently calling Fort McMurray home as he trains to become an operational police dog.

Contest rules are simple:

- Contestants can suggest only one name (one entry per person).
- The name may be for a male or a female pup.
- The name must start with the letter "J".
- The name must have no more than nine (9) letters.
- The name must be one or two syllables.
- Contestants must live in Canada and be 14 years old or younger.

• Although there can be only 13 winners, names not selected for the contest will be considered for other puppies born during the year

To enter, contestants must print their name, age, address, telephone number and the suggested name for a puppy on a postcard and mail it to:

The RCMP will accept more than one entry per household provided that each participant submits one name per postcard.

The deadline for entries is March 22, 2016. Contest winners and prizes will be announced on April 26, 2016.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

2016 marks the 20th anniversary of Black History Month being celebrated by the Government of Canada. Black History Month recognizes the achievements and contributions of black Canadians and allows fellow Canadians the opportunity to gain insight into the experiences of black Canadians and the roles they play in today's society.

On February 12th, Black History Month was celebrated at the Sawridge Inn & Conference Centre with a gala featuring traditional dancing and a fashion show. Jean Augustine, the first black woman elected to the House of Commons, was the special guest at the event; from 1993 to 2005, Ms. Augustine represented the Toronto riding of Etobicoke-Lakeshore as a Liberal MP. Supt. Rob McCloy, Insp. Mark Hancock and Cst. Annie-Claude Napoleon were honored to have been invited to attend the event. Cst. Napoleon, the only female black member of the Wood Buffalo Detachment, felt a sense of pride while at the event, 'I feel at home attending events such as this, and wearing the RCMP uniform while here is the icing on the cake, it shows great partnerships and I am so proud.'
